

# Introduction

The guide will provide a step-by-step approach to the information available on the Internet to any person who wishes to undertake the 'LifeStep' of learning to drive in Ireland.

Learning to drive starts with an application for a Driver Theory Test and obtaining a Provisional Driving Licence. It progresses to sitting and passing the practical driving test. This guide goes beyond the driving test and covers other aspects of motoring in Ireland, such as, advanced driver training, applying for motor tax **online** and more.

## Need to Know

A basic familiarity with the Internet and a PC is required.

## Need to Have

1. A valid **debit (Laser) card** or **credit card**.
2. A valid **e-mail** address.

# Step-by-Step Guide

## Step 1: Driver Theory Test

In order to obtain a provisional driving licence in Ireland you are required to complete a Driver Theory Test.

To prepare for the Driver Theory Test you will need to obtain a copy of the 'Official Driver Theory Test', which is available in book & CD-Rom format from:

- Bookshops throughout the country
- The Driver Theory Test Service – [www.dttts.ie](http://www.dttts.ie)
- Public Libraries in Ireland also stock this material for lending
- You can find a list of relevant reading material in the online version at this at this address [www.lifesteps.ie](http://www.lifesteps.ie)

Once you have studied the material you are ready to apply for the test.

### Step-by-Step How to apply

This can be done by accessing the Driver Theory Test Centre [www.dttts.ie](http://www.dttts.ie)

Click on **How to Book**.



From here you are given the option of downloading the application form by clicking on the appropriate [link](#).

Once opened, the application form can be printed by clicking on the **File** menu and then **Print**.

Alternatively, application forms for the driver theory test can be accessed by downloading them from Oasis (Online Access to Services, Information and Support) which is an Irish [e-government](#) website.

## Step 2: Obtaining a Provisional Driving Licence

Once you have passed the Driver Theory Test you can apply for your first Provisional Driving Licence.

It is a legal requirement to hold a provisional licence in Ireland before learning to drive on public roads. To undergo the driving test, you must hold a provisional licence covering the category in which you wish to be tested.

### Step-by-Step: How to apply

You can download a provisional driving licence application form from Oasis.

Click on **How to Apply** and select the link which enables you to print out the form.

You can also request the application form by post through Oasis.

You must have an email address to avail of this facility.

The Oasis website provides the option of requesting the form by post. When clicked, this link will bring you to the following screen.



Fill in the appropriate details and when completed click on the **Request form** button.

A message will be sent to your email address confirming your request.

All first time provisional licence applications must be accompanied by two passport photographs, a birth certificate or passport and a completed eyesight report form.

The eyesight report form is also available on the Oasis website.

By clicking on the appropriate link you can download the form.

All first time provisional driving licence applications must be accompanied by a completed medical report form if you suffer from any of the disabilities or diseases listed on the application form, or are 70 years of age or more.

The medical report form is also available on the Oasis website.

**You are advised to check in advance that your Motor Tax Office will accept downloaded application forms.**

### Step 3: Driving Lessons

Once you have a provisional driving licence the next step is to locate a driving school convenient to your location.

This can be achieved by accessing the Golden Pages website.

## Step 5: The Driving Test

Following on from the driving lessons is the driving test. You can view and print a driving test application form at

Click on **English** or **Gaeilge** as appropriate. Just select **Application Form** when you access this page and post the completed form to the address given. Alternatively you can apply for the driving test online.

In order to apply online, you must have a valid debit (Laser) or credit card (the cards currently accepted are Visa & MasterCard) and a valid e-mail address.

Enter all the details required in the driver testing information section – remembering to specify the Vehicle Category in which you wish to be tested and the Test Centre.

When completed, click on **Submit**.

A new screen opens containing your personal information. Before proceeding you must check the details of your application and make any necessary changes. Once the information is correct you are ready to pay. Select the **Pay Now** button.


Fill in the details of your credit card and select **Submit**.

Your application will normally be acknowledged by post within five days.

If you do not find the information you require you can e-mail the Driver Testing Section by selecting **Contact Information** and clicking on the e-mail link.



Click on **Send** when you have filled in the details of your enquiry.

## Step 6: Obtaining a Full Driving Licence

In Ireland, when you pass the driving test you are eligible to apply for a Full Driving Licence. Application forms can be downloaded from Oasis.

Click on **How to Apply** and select the link to **Download and complete application form.** Once opened select **File** then **Print**.

Alternatively, you can request an application form by post through Oasis.

You must have an e-mail address to avail of this facility.

Select **How to Apply**.

You are given the option of requesting the form by post. Fill in the appropriate details and when completed click on **Request form**. Be sure to include the required documents and fee when applying for your full driving licence. These requirements are specified on the application form itself.

**You are advised to check in advance that your Motor Tax Office will accept downloaded application forms.**

## Step 7: Beyond the Driving Test

### Advanced Driver Training

The Advanced Driving Test has been in existence since 1956. It aims to improve the standard of driving on the roads and the advancement of road safety. For information on Advanced Driver Training in Ireland and to apply for the Advanced Driving Test check, out the following website.

You can request a brochure and an application form for the test by e-mailing your details using the contact form on the website.

Open the website and select the **Contact Us** link. The following screen should open.

Once you have filled in the details, select **Send Request**.

You will get a notification that your request has been processed and accepted.

## National Car Testing

The National Car Testing Service is responsible for the implementation and operation of the car testing service in Ireland.

The NCT was introduced to improve road safety and environmental protection and to comply with an EU Directive, which makes car testing compulsory in all EU member states.

The NCTS will contact owners of eligible motor vehicles in advance of the anniversary date of first registration of your car. You will be offered a provisional appointment for the test that must be confirmed, cancelled or rearranged. This can be done using their online service.

To use the NCTS online services you must first read and accept their terms and conditions.

Once you have read the terms and conditions place a tick in the box as shown and select **Accept**.

# Glossary

- CD-Rom:** An optical disk made of foil in a plastic coat, that stores computer files. Much larger in terms of storage capacity than a floppy disk.
- Downloading:** The process of copying a computer file from the Internet onto your own PC is called downloading. A file such as a music (MP3) file or a document is made available to the Internet by storing it on a server. To download the file, you usually click on a link to it, or else right-click and choose 'save target as' (in Internet Explorer) or 'save link as' (Mozilla Firefox). A box pops up asking you where on your hard disk you want to store the file; you choose the location for storage, click the button and the file is copied onto your hard disk (or downloaded).
- E-government:** E-Government is a set of services that the state delivers to the public via the Internet. For example, the ability to pay tax online (at revenue.ie) is an E-Government service. E-Government has advantages for the consumer (no queuing, easy access) and for the government (low cost, efficient processing of information). Increased delivery of E-Government services is a priority for governments across Europe, including Ireland.
- E-mail:** **(Electronic mail)**  
Email is a service that sends messages across the Internet from one human user to another. Like a letter, email is person-to-person and it stores messages until they are read.
- Link/Hyperlink:** A link, or hyperlink, is a part of a web page that, if clicked with a mouse, opens a different web page. Links are usually shown in blue and underlined on a webpage.
- Online:** A word used as shorthand for 'on the Internet' or 'connected to the Internet'.
- Online catalogue:** Internet access to lists of items available in libraries.

**Purchase online:** The action of buying products and services over the Internet by consumers.

**Website:** A website is a collection of web pages which displays information on a particular topic. Common types of websites include company websites (information about the company), online shops (where you buy goods and services and pay by credit card) and personal websites (where individuals share their interests). A website may consist of just one page of information, but will usually contain several pages, all linked together. All the pages in a website usually share the same 'domain' name. For example, all the pages in the large online shop Amazon have an address (URL) that starts with 'www.amazon.com'.
